

YOUTH LEADERSHIP CONFERENCE FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS (FAQs)

1. What does a mentor do at the Youth Leadership Conference?

In a classroom setting, mentors are paired off with a small group of one to four high school students. The mentors then guide and stimulate the conversation between the students while the students work on two or three scenarios relating to character, ethics, and leadership. Mentors can share their own experiences when appropriate, but primarily serve to promote discussion between the students.

2. How much of my time is required?

No preparation is necessary. The half-day conference runs from 7:30 AM to 1:00 PM which includes lunch and two breaks.

3. What if I establish a connection with a particular student and wish to continue mentoring that student at a later date?

Many mentors go on to establish beneficial relationships with interested students, but please note that the permission to participate given by the parents/guardians of the students pertains only to the Youth Leadership Conference. To continue mentoring a particular student, separate permission should be obtained from the respective parent(s)/guardian(s).
