

Carbon Monoxide Detectors Now Required

The State has passed a law requiring all California single family homes to have carbon monoxide alarms/detectors. The bill, which became effective July 1, 2011, applies to every home with a "fossil fuel burning heater, appliance, fireplace or attached garage." The detectors will be required in other dwellings including apartments, condos, and hotels effective January 1, 2013.



The detectors should be installed in hallways leading to bedrooms, with a minimum of one per floor. If more are required, they must be interconnected. The devices may be battery-powered, a plug-in, or hard-wired with a battery backup. Detectors must be those certified and approved by the State Fire Marshall.

The Benefits of Recycling

Currently, about 61 percent of Glendale's waste is being diverted from the landfill through recycling and waste reduction efforts. Last year, Glendale residents and businesses recycled 11,309 tons of waste, including:

- 7,888 tons of paper
- 775 tons of glass
- 372 tons of aluminum and steel
- 609 tons of plastics

Since recycling reduces the amount of energy needed to extract, transport and process raw materials into new products, this translates into a net reduction of 4,724 tons of carbon emissions that lead to global warming. The recycled paper also left an estimated 134,096 trees still standing in the forests. And this is just from one City!

These benefits are one of the reasons behind the adoption of the California Global Warming Solutions Act of 2006. This legislation is the basis for an expected adoption in the coming months of mandatory commercial recycling in Glendale.
