## MESSAGE FROM SCOTT OCHOA



Glendale City Manager

With the beginning of June, we have the conclusion of the FY 2015-16 budget adoption process. Following two City Council budget study sessions and the Charter-required public hearing, the Council is poised to adopt a \$798 million total budget, featuring a \$183 million General Fund budget. While we continue to wrestle with the State of California over funding owed to the City of Glendale as confirmed by the courts in recent litigation against the State - I am pleased and proud to state that this year's budget features a \$2.7 million beginning surplus.

It has been nearly ten years since we've been able to say that. Granted, we must remain disciplined and vigilant. Our financial projections indicate minor deficits in coming years until pension cost ratesmoothing takes effect; however, I do believe that we are through the darkness of the Great Recession and into light of a new day. Indeed, the City Council's priority of fiscal responsibility is paying off.

To this end, this year's budget is both familiar and new.

structurally comprehensive budget Glendale has seen in many years. Because of the impact of the Recession, we have had to reengineer our operations and staffing. Glendale is today, trimmer and more efficient than any time in the last two decades, yet still able to offer an exceptional quality of life and service profile that is comparable to or exceeds any municipality in the region. This "productivity dividend" has been repurposed into investments in technology utilizing computerization and automation in areas as diverse as managing the Library's collection, to issuing traffic citations, to conducting fire inspections, to scheduling building counter visits, to reporting data and information to our residents. This, in turn, allows us to better control costs over the long-term and ensure that the programs and services most desired by the community are available.

The FY 2016-17 budget takes stock of the City's costs and liabilities in building, fleet and asset maintenance, technology infrastructure, operational and employment costs, and staffing. If the beginning of wisdom is truly to call things by their right names, then I believe that we have arrived at the intersection of knowledge and ability. That is, we have taken all of the good work that has been done to date to understand the complex challenges ahead of us and we have married them to the policy priority and funding to actually address them in meaningful wavs.

At the same time, the City Council has directed that we continue on our program of making strategic investments in our infrastructure. Major GWP projects in power transmission and water distribution, the Public Works Department's initiation of the Chevy Chase sewer diversion to LAGWRP (essentially, pushing more city sewage to our jointly-owned facility with LA versus relying on the Hyperion plant, thus saving money), the construction of the BeeLine Bus Maintenance Facility, the rehabilitation of the Central Library, and the major upgrades of Palmer and

## **Trail Safety Patrol**



The City of Glendale invites you to apply to become a member of the City's volunteer Trail Safety Patrol. The Patrol is made up of three units: the Hike Unit, the Mountain Bike Unit, and the River Unit. TSP members assist Community Services & Parks staff in protecting and maintaining the safety of park and open space visitors. They educate park visitors and trail users about the safe and courteous use of trails and park resources in the Verdugo Mountains, San Rafael Hills, and Deukmejian Wilderness Park. They serve as the "eyes and ears" for Glendale's Police and Fire Departments and observe and report damage to park facilities, unsafe conditions, and police, fire, and medical emergencies. All applicants must participate in an all-day training on Saturday, July 11th, at the Glendale Police Department. Mountain Bike Unit and Hike Unit applicants must also pass an additional skills and stamina test.

# **Economic Indicators**

\*\*\*\*\*\*\*



As of May 2015, economic indicators for the City of Glendale continues to demonstrate steady growth. A strong housing market with robust home improvementrelated spending evidences the trend. Compared to the 4th quarter of last year, spending on home improvement-related goods has increased dramatically. The boom is likely a result of new downtown resident shopping, while older homes are being upgraded to sustain increased value. Glendale's Class A office occupancy achieved par with region, a considerable improvement from a year ago. Unemployment in Glendale has been on a steady decline. Over the past year, the rate dropped a full percentage point from the prior year as it has in many areas of Los Angeles County. See the chart here.





## **Bulb and Battery Disposal**

Residents can drop off household fluorescent light bulbs and small used batteries at any <u>Glendale fire station</u>. The items collected at the stations will be transferred to the Glendale Fire Department Environmental Management Center (EMC) for proper disposal. Only fluorescent light bulbs and small batteries can be dropped off at the stations. extremely careful and follow these quidelines.

- When someone knocks on your door, acknowledge you are home
- If a person is trying to sell you something, he/she must have a commercial solicitation license issued by the City of Glendale Community Development Department. Ask to see the permit and make sure the dates are current. Possession of a commercial solicitation license does not mean the city endorses the product being sold.
- At no time should you let a solicitor into your home. Not even to use the phone.
- If you don't feel comfortable giving the solicitor any money DON'T! Do not let anyone "guilt" you into giving them money or buying their product.
- Do not believe stories such as, "I live in your neighborhood," or "My car is broken down just around the corner," etc. If you do not recognize the person as one of your neighbors, he/she is probably not. If their car is truly broken down, offer to call them a tow truck.
- Call your neighbors and warn them to watch out for suspicious activity.
- Look for suspicious behavior such as looking into car windows, testing doors and locks, or entering into back yards.

## Please Keep Conserving!



We appreciate all that our residents have done up to this point to conserve water, and we urge you to keep conserving and changing habits that lead to more conservation.

Glendale is in Phase III of our Mandatory Water Conservation Ordinance. Customers can only water their landscapes on Tuesdays and Saturdays for no more than 10 minutes per watering station.

Properly watering your landscape is one of the easiest ways you can save water. Do a weekly check on your sprinklers, to see if they are watering the landscape

and not the sidewalk, walkways or streets. Many times sprinkler heads are moved, or the direction of the spray is altered due to water pressure changes or lawnmowers. A simple check each week will help solve this common problem and will save you over 500 gallons a month!

Allow the grass to grow 3-3 ½ inches tall. Taller grass encourages deeper root growth and shades the soil from moisture loss. Also, consider installing a Drip Irrigation system to water plants and shrubs. Drip irrigation systems use approximately 50% less water than conventional watering techniques. Water from drip irrigation is less likely to evaporate before reaching plants because the water is directly applied to the plants' roots.

## Summer Employment & Leadership



The Glendale Youth Alliance is excited to announce a new pilot enterprise program, which will launch this summer. Previously, GYA programs predominantly served low-income, disadvantaged youth. This five week leadership program will give youth, that would otherwise not qualify for GYA programs, an opportunity to gain meaningful career development and employment during the summer months. Youth will receive training, intense case management and 80 hours of paid work experience at a worksite based on individual career interests.

Tuition is \$1,500 of which \$900 (60%) will go directly to youth wages and fringe benefits. The remaining \$600 pays for training & operational costs, which include: resume preparation, interview skills, workplace etiquette, career exploration & leadership development.

To qualify, youth must be 15 -18 years of age, have legal right to work documents & obtain a work permit. A \$150 deposit will be required at the time of registration and \$1,500 tuition must be paid in full by July 1, 2015. Deadline to apply is June 15, 2015.
