October brings Halloween which revolves around all things scary; and usually, the scariest things are those that we imagine, but cannot see. Take for example the issue that we will be introducing to the community this month: the possibility of converting from an at-large election system to council districts.

As recently as a decade ago, as part of the Charter Review Committee process, the Glendale community fully endorsed the issue of at-large elections - meaning that City Councilmembers are elected by the entire community to represent all corners of Glendale. Several years ago, however, the California Voter Rights Act (CVRA) changed specific definitions and terms that apply to the appropriateness of at-large elections. At this point, in the wake of lawsuits in other parts of State and other levels of government (especially school districts and community college districts), Glendale is exploring a conversion to a councildistrict system in order to preclude a CVRA challenge. While our diverse demographics and cosmopolitan composition belie any argument that we are

City Receives \$2.1 Million for Pedestrian / Bike Safety



The City of Glendale was awarded two State Department of Transportation grants which will transform the way pedestrian and bicycle safety is addressed in the city. somehow inconsistent with the intent of the CVRA, prudence and caution demand that we examine the overall issue.

Throughout the month of October and into November, the City Council and staff will be engaging in a thoughtprovoking dialogue with the community regarding both the potential conversion to council districts (versus at-large) elections, and the configuration of such a district system - five council districts versus seven council districts versus a directly-elected mayor versus a rotating mayor. We will be collecting this information during upcoming town hall meetings, an on-line survey (via glendalevotes.org), and presentations to community groups.

We are hopeful to have assembled enough information and feedback by December so that the Glendale City Council can make a decision on this matter before the end of the calendar year. If this issue moves forward, the Council could put this matter on the April 2015 general municipal election ballot as a City Charter amendment. If approved by the voters, then the next step would likely be the creation of a citizen panel to help oversee the drawing of the respective districts. The April 2017 general municipal election would be the first time that the districts would be in force.

This is a lot of effort for an issue that does not seem to impact Glendale in a real or meaningful way - after all, we have enjoyed tremendous leadership from nearly all walks of life, backgrounds and ethnicities represented in our community. Yet, the thought of changing to a different electoral format to address an abstract or perceived problem, and the fear of what that might entail in the long term, precipitates an anxiety that is real and palpable. It doesn't matter that we cannot see it or have not directly experienced it. It is change; an incongruity to that which we have come to know and rely on.

Unlike the legends of our childhood, there is nothing to fear in this process or decision... although we might still hear the wailing and moaning from some dark corners that sends a shiver down our spines. Instead, we are well-deserved to demonstrate some courage, common-sense, and faith that together we will come to know

Water Celebrates 100 Years of Reliable Service



This year the water utility is celebrating 100 years of reliable water service. Glendale's Municipal Water System began its operation in July 1914 with the passing of a \$248,000 bond issue. Due to inadequate water service, undersized water mains, insufficient reservoirs, lack of a circulation system, and pollution problems citizens elected eleven committee members to study these issues and make recommendations to the Board of Trustees of the City. The Board of Trustees then purchased a water system to serve the city's 14,000 person population with reliable services. Today GWP provides nine billion gallons of safe drinking water to the City's 33,700 customers and continues to operate with greater than 99.9% reliability.

Tips to Save Water and Energy in the Fall

- Open your window curtains during the day to allow sunlight to naturally heat your home, and close them at night to reduce the chill you may feel from cold windows.
- Use a low-flow showerhead and save up to 15 gallons of water per shower.
- Nearly 22% of indoor home water use comes from doing laundry. Save water by adjusting the settings on your machine to the proper load size.
- Nearly 60% of a person's household water footprint comes from lawn and garden maintenance. Turn off sprinklers a few days before it rains and keep them off a few days after.
- Think ahead! Don't use water to defrost frozen foods.

Glendale Galleria Storytimes


