Summer is over but it is time to come out and play...well, sort of

It's actually time to come out and plan to play. That is, thanks to the City Council's institution of development impact fees (DIF) on new development, the Department of Community Services & Parks is expecting to receive approximately \$16 million dollars in downtown, and near downtown, developmentrelated fees over the next 12 months. This is significantly more than the \$1-2 million per year the city had been averaging. Roughly one-third of this money has already come in and the balance will be remitted as developers submit their applications for permits based on their project entitlements. Funding from earlier waves of development brought some needed funding for regional draws like Deukmejian Park and the Riverwalk Park, both of which are unique park amenities that provide City-wide benefit. The City Council has directed that this next larger wave of funding be directed to the parts of the City that are adjacent to downtown and south Glendale development.

Glendale Appoints Fire Chief and Community Development Director





This influx of money isn't without strings attached, however.

DIF funds consist of a combination of Quimby Fees collected on new residential subdivisions and "Mitigation Fee Act" fees collected on all other types of development. Whereas Quimby Fees can be used to replace or repair existing playground apparatus or athletic fields, Glendale has not had many new residential subdivisions, and therefore, there is not a large pool of funding for this use. On the other hand, Mitigation Fees generated from downtown development comprise nearly all of the DIF funds at the City's disposal; yet they can only be used for new park and recreational facilities or library facilities, or for *new* features and amenities to existing parks or libraries in order to accommodate the demands of new residents on parks and libraries. Also, there is a 90%/10% split between parks and recreation dedicated fees versus library dedicated fees. With all of these regulations considered, there needs to be some framework for the community's interests in parks and recreation priorities. For example, acquiring improved properties for clearing, cleaning, and constructing a sizeable new community park in central Glendale would likely eat up all of the DIF money (and then some) in one fell swoop. Conversely, funds may be directed to a wide variety of allowable projects in a number of different locations. Thus, the City Council wants to hear from you.

Over the month of September and into October, the Department of Community Services & Parks (CSP) will be hosting three public workshops to talk with residents about community priorities for the investment of these dollars. Options will range from brand new amenities in existing parks (shade structures, bathrooms, community rooms, playgrounds, ballfields), to new parks (both large and small, and recognizing the tradeoffs of such large, singular investments), to working with our partners in the Glendale Unified School District to improve and open up existing school sites and public open spaces (after school hours and on weekends). There really are many terrific alternatives and, in all likelihood, we will see a combination of solutions and concepts. Please come out to the workshops and help plan

properly dispose of hazardous waste, check out the Central Library renovation, and so much more! Be sure to tune in to Charter channel 6 or check the City's <u>YouTube</u> channel for new episodes.

Drought Update

California is in the fourth year of one of the most severe droughts ever recorded and the City of Glendale, and cities throughout California, have implemented mandatory water conservation provisions. GWP has actively encouraged residents of reduction requirements and the community has reduced water use by an impressive 26%!

conservation provisions of city law and is applied at increasing levels during the different phases of mandatory conservation. The temporary fee is only used in emergency drought situations to keep the utility financially solvent. The Glendale City Council declared Phase II of conservation on July 29, 2014. However, in an effort to assist customers, Council suspended the drought charge for six months. On April 28, 2015, City Council instituted the Phase III of mandatory conservation in response to the ongoing unprecedented drought conditions. At that time, Council suspended the Phase III drought charge for six months, and began to charge customers the Phase II drought charge which had been postponed.

The purpose of the drought charge is twofold: First, to recover revenue shortfalls resulting from lower water sales directly related to conservation, and second, to promote targeted reductions in water consumption during periods of mandatory conservation. Customers that meet the usage reductions set during each phase of mandatory conservation will generally not see an increase in their water bill. The drought charge is applied equally to all water consumed and is not related to the tier levels.

During this period of prolonged drought, we all need to do our part to ensure that we have the water necessary to sustain our community. We also need to ensure the utility continues to have the funding necessary to maintain the water delivery systems. We thank all of our residents for their part in helping the state, the Southern California region, and the City of Glendale get through this drought. We look forward to working with our residential and business community to assist with water conservation. 


