An Upgraded Power Plant for Glendale and How it Benefits You



The Grayson Power Plant has been meeting the power needs of the City of Glendale for over 76 years. GWP is proposing to upgrade the Grayson Power Plant to have more efficient and reliable units that can produce more power and meet the current and future energy needs of the City of Glendale. The majority of the facilities at the Grayson Power Plant were completed between 1941 and 1977. The proposed project would replace all existing generation facilities, units, and related infrastructure with the exception of Unit 9, which was commissioned in 2003. Below are some of the benefits of this upgrade.

Better reliability: The current units at Grayson are very old (some have been around since the 1940s) and are very inefficient and costly to operate and maintain. The new units would be much more reliable, efficient, and would start up quicker.

Quicker Restoration Times: Repowering Grayson helps us get power back during major disasters or storms. Glendale has seen a few of these such as the Northridge Earthquake, The

To be sure, we all play a role in making Glendale the safe and desirable community that it is today. Without residents and business owners who actually care about what happens on their street or on their block, no amount of policing could stem the tide of lawlessness. In short, people have to care and believe that a safe and healthy community is within their grasp. At the same, this belief in a better place for family and friends is held together by the trust shared between the public and the police. If the trust is compromised, the belief is diminished; if the trust is broken, the belief can be destroyed. That is why having courageous and committed, wellequipped and well-trained, intelligent and ethical professional police officers is so important.

All across our country, we continue to be saddened and frustrated by fatal shootings by law enforcement of people who are unarmed, who appear to be compliant, or who at least do not pose a life-threatening hazard to police. At the same time, we see examples of communities that appear unable to get a handle on crime and violence on their streets, and police seem impotent to solve the problem.

Here, I think it is important to maintain context and perspective in examining these issues. First, far more communities are safer than not, far more police officers are competent and capable than not, and far more people are inherently good than not. Second, tragedy most often finds the weakest link in the law enforcement chain. Police officers and deputies are expected to go from "zero-to-60-miles-per-hour" in an instant, from mundane activity to adrenaline-pumping terror in seconds. Even the biggest heart can easily make a horrible mistake when he or she is scared or angry or confused. Thus, training and education are critical components to avoiding tragedy. Much of modern and effective law enforcement is mental understanding people and anticipating situations, adherence to carefully-crafted policies and standards. Third, culture makes an immense difference in this arena - the culture of the community and the culture of the organization mirror each other as they reflect mutual expectations and values like empathy and respect. When things go wrong in policing a community (as opposed to a singular tragic accident) you can almost bet that there is a dysfunctional culture that is rotting away the foundation of professionalism, which in turn diminishes expectations of respect and success, feeds resentment among the populace and a sense among the police of entitlement and isolation from the people they serve; this ultimately erodes the focus on training and knowledge standards, thus inviting any number of unfortunate outcomes in a self-fulfilling

Station Fire, and the fierce winds of December 2011 that knocked out power to many cities. While other cities were out of power for days, Glendale was able to get the lights back on within a few hours. Repowering Grayson would help us maintain that same reliability.

Less reliance on imported power: Currently, it costs more to operate the units at Grayson than to import power. The new units would be less expensive to run, meaning that we would not need to rely on imported power that isn't always readily available.

Integration of Renewable Resources: Grayson would be able to integrate with local and remote renewable energy resources that will support the City's compliance with California's Renewable Portfolio Standards.

Maintaining affordable rates: The new, highly efficient units would cost less to operate which translates to affordable rates for customers.

Increased water conservation: The current units at Grayson use groundwater, potable water, & recycled water for generation. The new units would only use recycled water.

This cascading relationship profiles the life and death of organizations and communities they serve. As evidenced here in Glendale, however, the opposite dynamic is true as well.

In Glendale, thanks to the commitment and investment by the Mayor and City Council, and the leadership of our Chief of Police and his management team, our officers and professional staff actually build positive momentum by partnering with the community as well as other agencies and colleagues. In areas like professional and skills development among patrol units, use of non-lethal force, shoot/don't shoot training, funding detectives and the DNA lab, utilization of grant funding and interagency collaboration, Glendale PD is able to bring more resources to bear - and each one is a force multiplier. It's no wonder that Glendale ranks 3rd in California and 6th in the nation for community safety among cities with +200,000 populations. By no means is this easy recruiting and retaining the best police officers and professional staff is laborious and expensive; however, it underscores Glendale's commitment to our collective safety. Like the Glendale Fire Department, adequately funding and staffing GPD can be seen as an insurance policy providing the maximum degree of protection and coverage. The job could be done for less if we are willing to accept less, which only makes good sense until we lose something of value. Instead, I prefer to think of our investment in Glendale's public safety as a frontline of protection – funded as efficiently as possible, yet as much as needed to do the job - and reinforced by a living and breathing partnership with the community. 
