

The 2017 wildfire season will go down as one of the worst in the States history.

From Jan. 1, 2017, through Dec. 31, 2017, over 9,000 fires burned more than 1.2 million acres, an increase from the previous year which brought 6,986 fires burning around 564,000 acres, according to Cal Fire. This anomaly was partly attributable to the strong gusts of the Santa Ana Winds and record breaking heat waves.

With the start of the new year, I'd like to call attention to the issue of emergencies, because if it can happen, it will. Glendale has seen it all – earthquakes, fires, floods, mudslides, train derailment and more. Fortunately, your very own Glendale Police and Fire Departments, as well as city staff, are always prepared to take on

the task of keeping our residents safe and protecting property in emergencies.

Did you know? All city employees, regardless of their title, are trained as official Disaster Service Workers. All Disaster Service Workers are required to report to work, and stay at work during and after a natural or manmade disaster.

Glendale takes this responsibility very seriously. Well in advance of an emergency, proactive measures are put into place to minimize a disaster's potential effects on life and property. We strengthen facilities, abate nearby hazards, and reduce potential damage to both structures and their contents. Throughout the year, we also train our personnel in activation and execution should a disaster occur. These proactive measures are combined in an **Emergency Operations Plan to** save lives and property.

When this team is pulled into action, our first priority is the protection of human life. We'll rescue residents, evacuate those in danger, suppress fires, establish first aid stations, maintain order and provide provisions. During emergencies, your city staff has many different responsibilities and will work hard to keep the lights on, water running, and roadways open.

The City of Glendale is ready for any disaster situation. However, it is important to remember that in a major disaster covering a large geographic area, assistance can take days. It is therefore important for you to prepare yourself, your family, your home, and your neighborhood. If we all stay ready, we don't have to get ready! With that being said, I would like to leave you all with 12 steps to take to prepare yourself and your family for an emergency. If you do one thing each month, by the time 2018 has passed (which will come sooner than you think), you will have taken big steps towards being ready for any emergency. It's as simple as...

The Central Park Plan turns the largest remaining green space in Downtown Glendale into a vibrant focal core. Central Park is for everyone and provides a front yard to the Central Library, the Adult Recreation Center, the proposed Armenian American Museum, but most importantly, it will be a stand alone destination designed for public engagement.

Central Park should accommodate numerous programs and features that will combine to make this a dynamic space available to a diverse group of users every day of the year. It will reach out through a system of inviting paseos that will connect it to the surrounding neighborhoods and beyond.

Prior to preparing preliminary conceptual plans, two outreach workshops will be held to involve the residents, businesses and other stakeholders from the Glendale Community. The workshops will seek to obtain public input in addressing existing needs and potential opportunities in the development of preliminary concept plans for this urban open space.





The Importance of the Grayson Repowering Project

The proposed Grayson Repowering Project means reliable energy in Glendale. This past summer, Glendale set a new record high for power usage of 350 MW per day. With only 20% of Grayson Power Plant currently in use due to old and aging infrastructure, Glendale barely avoided rolling blackouts. Our community needs Grayson to run at 100% to meet the current and future energy needs of Glendale.

The need to repower Grayson is also an environmental one. Per the Clean Energy and Pollution Reduction Act, Glendale Water & Power is required to obtain 50% of its energy from renewable energy sources by 2030. GWP already obtains 47% of its energy from renewable sources. Another 17% is carbon free. Repowering will give Grayson more capacity for renewable and carbon free energy, and in turn, a cleaner and environmentally-friendly Glendale.

Four years of hard work have gone into making the Grayson Repowering Project a comprehensive plan to revamp our power plant and provide the best reliable service to Glendale Water & Power customers.




