Glendale PD Rookie K9 Eddie Sniffs Out Burglary Suspect



On Tuesday, February 5, Glendale police officers responded to a possible residential burglary where several masked suspects were seen attempting to break into an occupied home.

When confronted by the homeowner, the suspects fled and responding officers spotted their vehicle as it was entering a local freeway. A high-speed pursuit ensued for several miles, putting several motorists, pedestrians, and pursuing officers in danger. Some of the occupants of the suspect vehicle bailed out of the car while it was still in motion; however, the pursuing officers concentrated their efforts on staying with the driver.

The pursuit came to an end at a cul-de-sac in the hills of Silverlake, where the driver exited and ran into a residential neighborhood. Despite the steep hillside terrain, Glendale officers established a large perimeter in order to contain the fleeing suspect. The Glendale K9 unit, consisting of K9 Idol, Jeff, and rookie "Eddie", responded to the scene to systematically search the neighborhood for the outstanding suspect.

The City's user-centered approach carries over from the online sphere to Glendale's active downtown. In early March, the Glendale City Council held a visioning workshop to kick off the information gathering phase of the Glendale Art & Entertainment District around Artsakh Avenue. And on March 26, Council will consider Downtown Specific Plan amendments, which inform downtown's urban design.

Also on the March 26 City Council meeting agenda is the introduction of the demolition deterrence ordinance. The ordinance was inspired by community activism and attempts to enhance the City's ability to deter illegal demolition of designated or potential historic resources and punish those responsible for the loss.

A community is built upon its history as well as its every day character. That's why the City has prioritized an ordinance regulating short term rentals. The ordinance would ban vacation rentals, in which a whole house or unit is rented out for 30 days or less. And it would permit home-sharing, in which the owner or resident host lives on site while renting out a room for 30 days or less. The Planning Commission will review the ordinance at a public meeting in May.

As for the electricity powering our city, Glendale Water & Power (GWP) has scheduled several community meetings throughout April to hear from the public about the Integrated Resource Plan (IRP). The IRP is a planning document that's meant to provide Glendale with guidance for GWP's electric supply.

Participation will ensure that your voice is part of the discussion shaping Glendale's energy future. You can start today by sharing your thoughts on the plan by taking an <u>online survey</u>. A full listing of IRP community meetings is available on <u>the homepage of GWP's website</u>.

Powered by community engagement, the horizon looks bright for Glendale! After coming up empty on his first three properties, K9 Eddie immediately exhibited a change of behavior on the fourth yard to be searched. K9 Eddie pulled his handler, Officer Matt Wilson, towards the downhill slope of the property towards the underside of a large patio deck.

Ofc. Wilson recognized this change of behavior and knew that Eddie was "in odor" of the suspect. This allowed the search team to seek cover since they did not know if the suspect was armed. From a distance and with the suspect still out of sight, officers gave the suspect additional warnings that a police K9 would be used if he did not immediately surrender, but there was no response.

K9 Eddie was told to continue his search of the yard, at which point he ran underneath the deck and located the suspect, who was deeply secreted in a small dark corner. K9 Eddie apprehended the suspect and dragged him from underneath the deck, where he was searched and handcuffed by awaiting officers.

Thanks to Eddie (and the rest of the K9s), a potentially dangerous suspect was located within a residential neighborhood and taken into custody without harm to the officers or the public.

Get Ready for Hot and Dry Conditions




Be prepared for the coming fire season by maintaining your property in a condition that does not promote the spread of a wildfire. Removing ignition sources within 100 feet of your home can significantly improve the chances of it surviving a wildfire. Here are some actions you can take today to get ready for the return of hot and dry conditions.

- Remove accumulated leaf litter and dead branches from roofs, gutters, and decks.
- Trim back branches on nearby trees and bushes so there is at least 5 feet of clearance from the sides and roof of your home.
- Remove dead shrubs and trees on your property
- Break up large, dense clusters of vegetation by removing or thinning bushes and trees.

The Glendale Fire Department annually inspects all properties in the High Fire Hazard Area for hazardous vegetation conditions. Inspections begin May 1st. If your home is subject to an annual inspection you will receive a notification letter and the annual Vegetation Management Program (VMP) inspection bill starting April 1st.




