What audits are in the works?

Sameel Salim is busy diving deep into the City's contract with Dell. He will be looking to see if adequate controls exist in contact administration. He will also determine whether the City is paying competitive pricing for the recent large volume of computer purchases from the City's quick shift to remote work in response to COVID-19.

Natalie Minami-Valdivia is

shifting gears after having just completed an audit of the City's pandemic plan, and is about to start a research project on the **Enterprise Risk Management** (ERM) framework. Natalie will explore how other government agencies manage their risks, how their ERM framework is adopted, and how they manage staffing.

Ani Antanesyan is in the learning stage of her audit, where she is conducting research on the City's Compressed Natural Gas Fueling Facility and resulting contract. Ani will be focusing on the parts of the contract that address fuel pricing to ensure that the billing is based on the contract terms, and that the terms follow industry best practices.

Championing a culture of continuous improvement at City Hall

Promoting a culture of continuous improvement is a top priority at City Hall. This involves focusing on making incremental positive changes that help the organization in the long-term. One way to accomplish this is through "lean" principles that encourage the organization to continually look at our processes and work on ways to improve them.

To this end, the City has selected 15 staff members (shown in the table below) from 11 departments to participate in Lean Six Sigma training. Lean Six Sigma is a program that provides a framework for **creating efficiencies** in an organization. It combines a Six Sigma focus of quality improvement with the Lean emphasis of streamlining processes. This training is being presented in partnership with Glendale Community College's Professional Development Center (PDC).
